

## Director's Report February 6, 2017

### Building Trades

Progress continues on the Tiny House. The roof is complete, the windows are in, the trim is being painted, and the siding is being installed and should be ready for stain early this week. This will complete most of the exterior work. Interior work begins the week of Feb. 13. Plumbing and electric will commence followed by insulation, interior walls, cabinets, countertops, flooring, appliances and fixtures. Our projected completion date is March 10. Mr. Cail will hold two "all build" days during the February vacation week to make sure our deadline is met. Of the five tiny houses being built in the state, currently only two are slated for 100% completion by the NHHBA Home Show March 17 and ours is one of them.

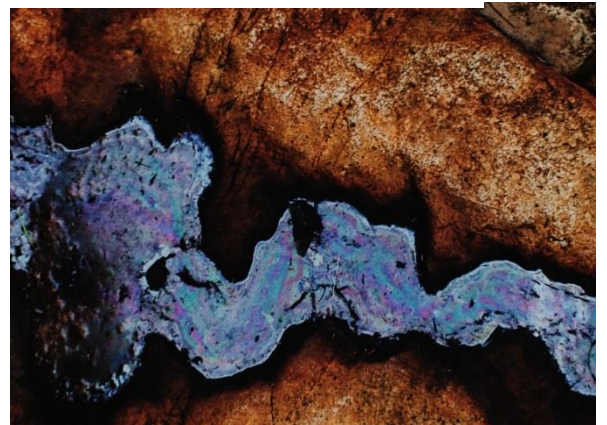
